You are their boss. □ Stop worrying about what others are not doing, or what you think they should do, and take action and responsibility for yourself. □ Host or be a catalyst for regular gatherings to discuss current issues and solutions with friends and neighbors and develop a plan of action for uncertain times. □ Understand the jurisdictional boundary of every government entity that collects tax or fee money from you to run government programs. Start by looking at your property tax statement. □ Be educated about your local politics because local issues impact your life much more than national issues. □ Respect, and demand respect from your elected officials and unelected bureaucrats, even if they don't agree with you. | | | | |
